re-gather-ing

“But, brothers and sisters, when we were orphaned by being separated from you for a short time (in person, not in thought), out of our intense longing we made every effort to see you.”

—1 THESSALONIANS 2:17, NIV

The Apostle Paul was no stranger to feelings of loneliness and isolation. Having developed deep friendships with the people in the churches he ministered to, he often found himself longing to be with them in-person after his circumstances required him to leave them. Hence the deeply personal and emotional tone of the epistles.

His first letter to the Thessalonians is no exception to this. He described the sadness of his separation from them as having been “orphaned.” He found himself in a state of “intense longing” to see his friends again. It felt to him as though his family had been torn apart. In other words—he missed them!

Sound familiar?

We have been in a similar situation, not only at First Baptist, but at local churches around the world, as the Body of Christ has been forced by the COVID-19 pandemic to adapt our methods to continue ministering safely in a changing world. Surely, the steps we have taken have helped to slow the spread of the virus and now that the vaccine is being administered, there is hope of a slow but sure return to normalcy in society. Not only that, but this whole situation has challenged us, in a very positive way, to reexamine our approach to just about everything—helping us to grow along the way.

Keeping these things in mind, the Diaconate Board has been prayerfully discussing plans to expand our Sunday morning ministry to include more participants in-person. We have decided to use a “hybrid approach,” offering our worship services both in-person and online simultaneously. This will make it so that those who wish to gather in-person can do so while those who prefer to worship from home can do so as well. We have made a purposeful decision to stay away from the term “re-opening” because the truth is, we never closed!

Here is the basic timeline that will guide our process:

Sunday, March 14 - We will have a “dry run” with ushers and cleaning volunteers present at church to practice all protocols that will be necessary when we expand our ministry. The goal is also to have all A/V equipment in the balcony by this time. (Currently, much of our A/V equipment is on the main floor of the sanctuary).

Sunday, March 21 - Since all A/V equipment will by this time be in the balcony, this will be the day we “go live” with live-streaming from the balcony. There will be no additional people in the building this day other than members of the “Skeleton Crew.”

Sunday, March 28 - Re-Gathering Sunday. On this day, we will welcome members of the congregation who are NOT part of the "Skeleton Crew" to join us for in-person worship, if they are comfortable doing so. Ushers and cleaning volunteers will ensure we follow our COVID protocol strictly. All worshippers will be required to wear a mask in order to enter the building. This is also Palm Sunday.

Sunday, April 4 - Easter Sunday. Both our Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday services will follow the same basic format as that of our current live-stream services. The church will open for people to come in at 10:30am. The Khmer language devotional will take place in the sanctuary from 10:45-11am. The English service will start at 11am. Ushers will greet you at one designated point of entry on 12th street. Then, after the service, ushers will dismiss you and direct you to the designated exit. For now, there will only be one worship service featuring a "blended" style. In the interest of public health, there will be no coffee hour after the services, nor will there be an Easter brunch this year.

For now, we will be limiting gathering size for our FBC worship services to 150 people. We anticipate that many people will continue to worship online from home for a while and as such, we believe it will be easy for us to keep our gathering size under that level.

I am certain many of you will have questions about this timeline and wonder how it will all work. That is why I wanted to inform you of this plan as soon as I could. Moving forward with re-gathering will require certain conditions to be met first, including the availability of volunteers. If you have questions or concerns about re-gathering or if you would like to volunteer to be part of the ushering and cleaning teams, please just reach out to me directly. Please continue to pray for us as we embark on this journey of safe and healthy transition.

Welcome to: “The Path”

“The Path” is a community of people who are interested in reading the Bible together—some for the 1st time and others for the 21st time. Some of us are reading the entire Bible in 1 year, some are reading it in 2 years, some are reading it in 4 years, and others are reading it only every once in a while.

We use something called the M’Cheyne reading plan, developed by an 18th-century Scottish pastor. Yes, it’s sort of old-school. The plan is available through the free “YouVersion” app. on smartphones. Depending on how quickly you want to read the Bible, people can read either 1, 2, or 4 chapters a day in order to reach their goal.

For those who want to dig deeper, “The Path” also offers a weekly conversation group on most Tuesdays at noon. We talk about whatever the Scripture of the day happens to be on that day. You can join the conversation via Zoom or in-person at First Baptist Church of Portland (upstairs above the Fellowship Hall in the “Zoom Room”).

Lenten Devotional Candle Craft



If you are interested in taking some time to pause and reflect, but have a hard time sitting still to meditate or maintaining interest in reading, maybe what you need is a good old-fashioned craft. For Lent this season we are offering a Lenten Devotional Candle Craft. You can get your craft kit in one of three ways. Either make an appointment with Pastor Chris to pick it up at church, get one at March's Drive-up Communion, or request one to be mailed to your address.

If you would like to do it at home, first get a candle in a glass holder (The Dollar Store usually has white, unscented candles called saint candles for a buck). You will also need some magazines and glue. Flip through the magazines and cut out words, shapes, swatches of colors, or anything else that feels inspiring to you. Glue these around your candle covering up the candle within. If cutting and pasting magazines seems like too much, then get a printout of the Lenten candle covering from church and tape it around the candle. Candle coverings can also be mailed out.

Put your candle in a place where you will see it regularly. Then, anytime you feel reflective throughout Lent (like, for instance, while watching church Sunday morning on Facebook), light the candle and reflect on all that God has done for you and all that you are called to do in return.

Maundy Thursday

One of the things I miss most during this pandemic is sitting around a table and breaking bread with one another. As we approach Maundy Thursday, a night where we commemorate the last night and meal Jesus had with his disciples, the urge to sit around a table grows even stronger. The Maundy Thursday service is also one of my favorite services in the church calendar.

This year I would like to invite you to a time of breaking bread virtually on the night of Maundy Thursday (April 1). We will get together on Zoom, share a meal, have communion, sing a hymn or two, read scripture from that fateful evening, and pray with one another. All you need to prepare is whatever you are having for dinner that night, piece of bread and something to drink for communion, and a willing spirit. I really hope you will join me.



have discovered six essential strategies any church can use to better involve and retain young people and breathes life and vitality into the whole church. They are:

- Unlock keychain leadership: Instead of centralizing authority, empower others—especially young people.
- Empathize with today's young people: Instead of judging or criticizing, step into the shoes of this generation.
- Take Jesus' message seriously: Instead of asserting formulaic gospel claims, welcome young people into a Jesus-centered way of life.
- Fuel a warm community: Instead of focusing on cool worship or programs, aim for warm peer and intergenerational friendships.
- Be the best neighbors: Instead of condemning the world outside your walls, enable young people to neighbor well locally and globally.
- Prioritize young people (and families) everywhere: Instead of giving lip service to how much young people matter, look for creative ways to tangibly support, resource, and involve them in all facets of your congregation.



The Growing Young Initiative is a program to assist churches in our American Baptist region to learn these six core strategies and find congregations to implement them. I will be heading up the team at First Baptist and am looking for interested people who want to see First Baptist Church last long by growing young. First Baptist COVID-19 and Re-Opening Update

Taking into account the most reliable information from the State of Oregon and Multnomah County, FBC will continue to offer worship services through live-streaming only during most of the month of March. However, we are excited to announce that we plan to begin re-gathering in-person on March 28.

Please note that the live-stream will still be provided on March 28 and going forward for those who prefer to attend church from home. The CD ministry will also continue indefinitely.

“Drive-Up Communion” will still be offered on both March 7 and April 4, from 8:30 am - 9:30 am as we go through this time of transition and seek to meet the spiritual needs of the various members of our church family.

A detailed “COVID-19 Protocol” document has been adopted by leadership. Staff and volunteers will be taking steps during the month of March to make sure FBC is prepared to re-gather safely when on March 28.

Public Service Announcement – Watch Out for Scammers!

Lately, we have heard of various online scams that have been targeting folks in our community, including members of First Baptist Church. It seems there are various types of scams, but the most common type involves email. The scammer generally pretends to be a member of FBC staff, a person in need, or even another church member, and asks the person being targeted to help them out by purchasing some gift cards. PLEASE DO NOT DO THIS—IT IS A SCAM. No member

of FBC staff would ever ask you to do something like this. If you receive emails like this, ignore them or delete them. Often, the scammer will use a phony email address that looks like it is from the person being impersonated. But generally, if you look closely at the address, you will be able to see that it is not from the person being impersonated. If you ever have a question as to whether or not an email is actually from the church, just call the church office to confirm.

FIRST BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Foundation is an Oregon nonprofit corporation, established in 1962.

The purpose of the Foundation is to provide an endowment which supports programs of First Baptist Church of Portland, Oregon and other ministries of American Baptist Churches-USA.

FOUNDATION RELATIONSHIP WITH FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

The First Baptist Foundation and First Baptist Church of Portland share common concerns, purposes and constituency, but are separate corporations. The directors of the Foundation must be members of the First Baptist Church.

Donations, bequests and other forms of gifts made to the Foundation are managed by the Board of Directors of the Foundation. Those made to the First Baptist Church of Portland are administered by the church's Stewardship/Property Committee.

FOUNDATION GIFTS

The Board of Directors meets each October to assign the earnings of Foundation investments to organizations that are affiliated with, or supported by, American Baptist Churches USA.

The Foundation gives to the unified budget of First Baptist Church of Portland, plus special church ministries and projects. Those include evangelism, missions, youth activities, feeding program, worship enhancement and building improvements. Other organizations who receive gifts are listed on the back.

DONATING TO THE FOUNDATION

Donations to First Baptist Foundation are "living gifts," which last in perpetuity.

Giving to the Foundation can be an opportunity to celebrate a special event in your life; as a memorial for a loved one; or, as a final legacy, to help support the missions and ministries of First Baptist Church of Portland, and American Baptist Churches USA.

Gifts come to the Foundation in several forms: cash, annuities, stocks, bonds and other securities, real estate or other tangible assets, life insurance, trusts, bequests from estates, memorial gifts.

The benefits of giving to the Foundation can include reduced current income taxes; reduced estate taxes; and can provide the donor with a continuing lifetime income.

Other recipients of Foundation gifts:

- **Camp Arrah Wanna**, a regional American Baptist camp in Welches, Oregon near Mount Hood.
- **Cambodian Children's Ministry**, a school in Kampong Chhnang Province, Cambodia, serving 450 local children.


